## Visibility Matters: Pima Council on Aging's Answer to Inequities in Healthcare & Care Giving By Harrison Orr

Have you ever sat in a doctor's office wondering if you should tell your doctor or their staff that you identify as part of the LGBTQI+ community? Perhaps you also wondered if you would be treated differently if you did tell them or if it would even make a positive difference in your care. I know I've thought about these things, especially when my doctor told me that my insurance wouldn't cover the cost of a routine HIV test, and therefore he wouldn't order one for me. I thought, "Should I tell him I'm a gay man and see if that makes a difference or just let it go?" I let it go. Wouldn't it be great if we didn't have this extra layer of concern when seeking medical help? And yet we do.

Sarah Bahnson, Pima Council on Aging's LGBTQI+ Community Liaison, is trying to do something about it by training healthcare providers to be more sensitive and responsive to the needs of aging LGBTQI+ patients. Visibility Matters is a series of two-hour workshops for anyone serving LGBTQI+ older people in Pima County. Supported in part by Senior Pride, among other great organizations, the workshops provide trainees with the resources and information needed to better understand and serve the needs of LGBTQI+ older people. Trainees will be given historical context on the ways in which LGBTQI+ people may have difficult relationships with community institutions. Trainees will also learn about the impact of intersectionality on basic needs, specific vulnerabilities of LGBTQI+ older

people in healthcare environments, and how to provide the best support and resources to these individuals.

Sarah states, "Discrimination, past and present, creates health disparities and barriers to care for LGBTQI+ people accessing aging services." This program is intended to help alleviate these disparities and barriers. In addition to Visibility Matters, Pima Council on Aging offers a wealth of resources and programs for older adults and their loved ones. Their website provides information on services such as transportation, housing, and nutrition. They host Memory Cafés for individuals living with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias, as well as their caregivers. The cafés provide a safe space for individuals to interact with art, music, and one another.

Cecilia Vicuña is a Chilean artist and activist who resides in New York City. She is interested in the ancient Andean technology known as a quipu. These devices, made of woven textiles, are thought to have been used for recording keeping, with knots representing different numbers. Through her artwork, Vicuña seeks to honor the traditions of Indigenous peoples across the globe. She hopes to make others aware of the impact society has on the earth by using plant matter and artists' studio scraps in her Sonoran Quipu, a site-specific installation at MOCA Tucson. 
If you've ever been to a public library in Tucson, there is a good chance that you've interacted with Toby Wehner, a friendly library associate in a homemade tie dye shirt. Over a span of thirty years, Toby has worked in some capacity at 23 of the Pima County Public Library's (PCPL) 27 branches. Passionate about sharing his love of reading, his goal is to eventually work at all 27 branches. In February 1992 Toby bought a one-way ticket to Tucson and left his small town home in Wisconsin. He was determined to be out as a gay man in every aspect of his life in Tucson. He found PCPL to be an accepting employer for LGBTQ+ employees when he started working at the Murphy-Wilmot Library as a page, shelving books. Not only did he discover what was to become his lifelong career and passion, but he also met his husband, Rick, who worked as a page as well.

After having been together since 1993,

Rick and Toby were married in the historic courthouse in Downtown Tucson in 2014. While Rick's tenure with the library was short lived, eventually settling on interior house painting as a career, Toby, on the other

hand, is proud to say that he "just never left" the library. He now calls the Joel D. Valdez Main Library home. He loves working in the heart of downtown where people of all backgrounds come together. The main library has become a public services hub for many people living and working downtown. Whether you need an athome COVID test, want to register to vote, or are looking for a large print book, the library has you covered. Toby is proud of the variety of services the library provides for the community.

One of Toby's favorite tasks at the library is to take the PCPL book bike for a spin, filling free mini libraries with used books. When it's not



in use, the book bike is parked in the lobby of the main library. Flyers for upcoming library events, as well as bookmarks and other useful information, can be found on top of the book bike's cart.

**He strongly believes in the work** is very important to Toby. **Senior Pride does throughout** the community and loves to collaborate with us.

The LGBTQ+ community He is one of the founding members of the PCPL Pride Committee, which started in 1997 as the LGBTO+ Services Committee. The committee strives

to make the library a welcoming place for all members of our community. Readers can visit their website for staff-selected LGBTO+ book recommendations. The committee also hosts community events, such as author talks. Toby became acquainted with Senior Pride through a virtual artist talk with local celebrity and Senior Pride favorite, Carlos Valenzuela. He strongly believes in the work Senior Pride does throughout the community and loves to collaborate with us. If you're ever in a library and see Toby in his tie dye shirt putting away a cart of books, helping guests at the counter, or filling in for story time, be sure to stop by and say






